The entrepreneurial venture creates a new technology or a new way to buy, sell, produce and distribute an existing product or service. Entrepreneurs often begin as one-person startups and can grow to become the largest and most successful companies the world has ever known. Understanding these ventures requires a different set of tools than needed to understand the traditional large firm. Successful entrepreneurs have a high sense of opportunity recognition AND problem solving. This course will identify the unique differences to traditional corporate and large scale business finance, operations, sales, marketing, HR and other company functions. Students will also begin to understand the concepts of a business model and customer development via guiding texts - Business Model Generation [BMG] and The Startup Owner's Manual [SOM] at a much deeper level.
